The United States and Canada's Fentanyl Epidemic

What is Fentanyl?

Low doses of fentanyl are prescribed by doctors to treat severe pain. It is more addictive and dangerous than other opioid medications. Illicitly manufactured fentanyl that is created in China arrives in postal and commercial modes has increased the supply and availability.

The U.S. and Canada are the world's largest consumers of opioids per capita.



10,000 + opioid-related deaths since 2016.



Public Policies Regulating Opioid Consumption



2017 Amendments

The federal government made the following changes to the Controlled Drugs and Substance Act and the Customs Act:

- Streamlined applications for supervised consumption sites.
- Prohibited the importation of devices used to make fentanyl such as pill presses and encapsulators.
- Allowed Canada Border Services Agency officers to search mail weighing 30g or less.



Good Samaritan Laws

36 states have civil protection laws in place and 33 states have criminal protection laws to protect bystanders who help overdose victims. This encourages bystanders, who may be consumers themselves, to help rather than avoid calling 911. 12

- Supervised consumption sites are illegal.
- The federal government has barred sites from opening in Seattle, Denver, New York, and Philadelphia.

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone is a medication given to suspected overdose victims. It is commonly called by its brand name Narcan. There are two forms available via injection or by nasal spray.

Chemical & Technological Precautionary Measures for Consumers

Consumers can chemically analyze their drugs for the presence of substances like fentanyl through the use of Fourier Transform Infrared Technology (FTIR) and Fentanyl Test Strips (FTS). 19
